## Meet the Council: Terry Mayberg

*To help you get to know the St. Joseph Parish Pastoral and Mission Council, we'll be publishing biographies of each member in the coming months. This week- **Dr. Terry Mayberg***

Terry Mayberg's life has always revolved around the Catholic faith and service to others, but the landscape and tenor of that faith and service have always been evolving.

Terry was raised in Laredo, Texas but moved to Lakewood, Washington, at age ten, when her father, a pilot, was stationed at Joint Base Lewis-McChord. Her mother is from a large (think: 40+ aunts, uncles, and first cousins) Hispanic family in Texas, for whom Catholicism was at the very heart of family life. "It's a part of me," Terry explains. "It defined how I was raised." The family – mom, dad, Terry and her five brothers – put down roots in Lakewood, helping found St. John Bosco Catholic Church.

Jesuit spirituality entered the picture when Terry attended Gonzaga University. It would forever inform her life and decision-making. After undergrad, she went on to attend medical school at the University of Washington School of Medicine (UWSOM) – a decision she says she made because it was a way of giving back to the community, a tenant of Jesuit ideas of service to others.

She became an associate professor at UWSOM, and practiced anesthesiology at Harborview Medical Center throughout her career. Again, Jesuit ideas of service formed her life decisions. She was drawn to Harborview, she says, because it is the place where the most marginalized people are treated, as well as people "who may-be having the worst day of their lives."

Terry met her husband Marc, also a doctor, in the operating room. They have a son, who attended Gonzaga and received his MBA from Seattle U, and a daughter, who is at Santa Clara University. Both of their children attended St. Joseph School.

The family has been attending St. Joe's since the early 1990's. "From the moment I walked in the door, it felt like home," Terry says. "More so than any church I'd been to before." At home indeed, the family asked Fr. Glen to preside at their daughter's quinceañera. "Maybe the only quinceañera that's been celebrated at St. Joe's," Terry laughs. "Or at least in recent memory."

After retiring from practicing medicine, life has seemingly only gotten busier! She founded a medical careers exploration program for under-represented high school students, followed by founding the Gonzaga Seattle Summer Biomedical Internship program – a collaboration between Gonzaga and Swedish Medical Center, as further ways of giving back.

In retirement, another aspect of Terry's life, visual art, has become, as she puts it, another part of her identity. She has studied acrylic and oil painting at Gage Academy for 15 years, but is now able to put her full creative energy into what used to be a hobby. Terry exhibited her first show in Georgetown last year.

Terry looks forward to serving the parish as a member of the Council, empowering lay leadership at the church. "Each of the last three popes have stressed the importance of parishioners taking co-responsibility for church life. Not just as followers of Christ, but as apostles, as well."

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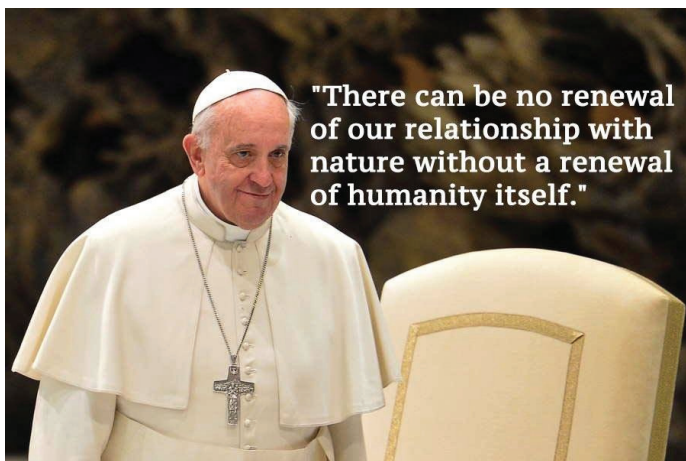
## St. Vincent de Paul Diaper Drive - Please Help

## Sister Parish Update: Desarollo Humano Popular Scholarship House Purchase

Since our last update in February, we have been earnestly working through the significant logistics involved in purchasing a house for DHP scholarship students by this summer. Unfortunately, our plans were put on hold as the impact of COVID-19 affected the entire globe, including El Salvador. The country went into lockdown in mid-March and only recently started to re-open; their growing infection rate may slow or stop efforts to restart the economy.

As anticipated, earlier this year, the DHP students had to relocate to a temporary rental house near the National University due to their previous house's habitability issues. When the quarantine began, all students had to vacate the DHP house and go back home, where some could resume online classes. Many were challenged by the lack of WiFi connectivity in their homes, however.

The temporary house lease ended in July, and a new lease was signed for another house near the university. While they are secure for the moment, the students are looking forward to having a permanent residence they can finally call home!

We are hoping to resume the search process as soon it is prudent and as government restrictions are eased. In the meantime, we are working to get everything ready the moment we can resume the search. We negotiated an agreement with the Jesuits of San Salvador (part of the Central American Province) to oversee the funds transfer, acquisition, and ownership of the house. The funds are in the process of being transferred.

Furthermore, we have the real estate attorney in San Salvador ready to assist us in the negotiations and contract review. He has graciously offered to discount his time in support of this amazing program. We are still hopeful that, by the end of the year, a house will be purchased and occupied by the DHP students. *However, we won't rush this process. Four Examen for Life Today  
4 Tuesdays, October 6, 13, 20, & 27, 2020

In the range of issues we face this Fall - our daily life and relationships, the pandemic, cries for racial justice, our civic life and more - we may wonder how and where we can find God. One key Ignatian tool to help us explore these spiritual questions is the Examen, an ancient practice of prayerful reflection on the events in our life to help us see God's hand at work in our whole experience.
