

October at St. Joe's: Coming Home

Fall is here, and as the leaves turn and children return to school (whether virtual or in-person), we look ahead as a community, towards All Saints Day and eventually, Advent. Of course, there is no ignoring the fact that we are heading into this normally joyous season under the "new normal" of the pandemic. While this is a time of great uncertainty, it can also be a time of hope and grace.

St. Joseph invites you to join with us this October as we celebrate "Coming Home," a time of spiritual and community renewal. Whether you are able to join us for inperson Mass or participate virtually, we are all "Ignited by the Eucharist to Love and Serve," as the Parish mission statement proclaims. This month, the Parish will be hosting events, both in-person and virtual, that will focus on re-igniting a sense of community, of family, and of our unbreakable bond as a church. The first event was our annual Blessing of the Animals on October 4th, a family-friendly (and socially-distanced) event to show our appreciation for the earth, and all her creatures.

In addition to other events to be announced, the Pastoral and Mission Council will be hosting a Zoom panel discussion on October 25th: "Worship at Home," a candid talk about how we bring the church into our homes – praying as a family, watching video Masses together, and keeping in touch with our social groups.





I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.







Invitation to Join in Solidarity with Victims of Police Violence

St. Joe's, at the invitation of Immaculate Conception Parish, is planning a public display of solidarity for victims of police violence. On the first weekend in November, commemorating the Feast of All Souls, we will be placing thirty signs on the northeast lawn, each containing the name of a person killed by the Seattle Police Department.

Before the installation, we invite families to take a sign home with them. Use this opportunity to pray for the family of the victim, talk to your family about racial injustice, and meditate on what actions you can take to dismantle racism. How can we say "No" to state sponsored violence that disproportionately harms our Black, Indigenous and People of Color brothers and sisters? We invite you to decorate the border of the signs with tasteful art and phrases of hope, healing, and solidarity.

Children's Faith Formation

Sacramental Preparation for Older Children -- Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults, Adapted for Children

For youth who are between 4th grade and high school, RCIA/C (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults, Adapted for Children!) is the process "catching up" on missed Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist). Starting in January, St. Joseph will hold sessions once a week. This process may take place either in person or on Zoom, depending on the health guidance at the time. First Communion Preparation (1st and 2nd grade Sacramental Preparation)

Preparation for First Communion is a 2-year process, beginning in 1st grade. For this fall's classes, the church classes will be offered every other week via Zoom and a parent or older sibling will be asked to attend. Our first class will be Oct. 18th on Zoom. Children's Liturgy of the Word – worship.pastoral.center

This is an independent online service created with Catholic families in mind. It's a bit more interactive than watching a Mass. There's an opening and closing song with motions that the kids can sing/dance along to, the gospel reading (a kids version or the NAB translation,) a brief cartoon or video about the gospel aimed for young kids, reflection questions for the family to discuss together, and a time for intercessions, etc. Families that use it can follow all the elements, or pick and choose those parts that work best for their family and the ages of their kids. The services are offered for free and are posted a few days before each Sunday.

REACHING OUT

OCTOBER 2020

In Ignatian spirituality, the Magis speaks to our desire for the "the greater" or "the more." We seek the Magis in our family life when we embrace growth over success and continually ask how we can be more loving. The Magis Family Formation Project is powered by a group of parishioners. Our goal is to create a monthly family faith sharing guide to support families who are seeking to practice their faith at home during this time of COVID. Magis will offer a "menu" of options and parents and kids can pick a few things together which would work well for their family. Magis will include lectionary-based activities, faith-based quarantine crafts, as well as prayer and service activities. Magis will be written for kindergarten, primary, and middle school youth. We hope these ideas will help you encourage your family to tune in to the greater movement of God in your family in these busy times.

This month's theme is "Reaching Out," an apt theme for our inaugural Magis installment. All our activities and prayers are focused on how we can reach out, share, and connect with each other in our church community. Reaching out and connecting seems more precious than ever.




