

November is Stewardship Month!

What does Stewardship mean to you?



As the leaves change and Autumn's chill starts to permeate the air in Seattle, I'm reminded that it is indeed November! How the time flies. It seems like only yesterday that I was starting a new job here at St. Joe's, as the Director of Advancement, although that was almost a year ago! Along with All Saints, Thanksgiving, and the beginning of Advent, November is also Stewardship Month here at St. Joseph Parish. Lately, I've found myself reflecting on what stewardship means to me and the role it plays in my life. I keep returning to one question: "Am I using my

gifts to care and generously share for the good of others, or to benefit myself?"

I think of the folks who run the St. Joe's chapter of St. Vincent de Paul, who are caring for our neighbors in this most uncertain of times, or the Sister Parish committee, raising funds to purchase a house for students in El Salvador. I'm reminded of all the work that lay leaders have done to pivot to all-online ministries, and the people who donate a bit of money to keep the lights on and the boiler running.

Knowing that I am surrounded by such generosity makes it easy for me to feel joy in what I can offer to others. Good stewardship, discerned in love, guides me to receive God's gifts gratefully, nurture God's gifts responsibly, share God's gifts justly and charitably, and return those gifts to God abundantly.

Because I joined the team right before the pandemic hit, I haven't been able to meet as many of you in person as I had hoped to. But that time will come. If this year has taught me anything, it's

patience! In the meantime, I am awestruck by the generosity I have witnessed in this community in the time, talent, and treasure given by so many. I look forward to getting to know you, the parishioners, who give this parish so much life.

Let us pray for ourselves and others who are missing friends and family. May this be an opportunity to write a letter or call someone who is in your thoughts.



All the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures. They prostrated themselves before the throne, worshiped God, and exclaimed:


"Amen. Blessing and glory, wisdom and thanksgiving, honor, power, and might be to our God forever and ever. Amen."

and the life of the world to come. Amen.







Jesuit Refugee Services 40th Anniversary & #40miles4refugees

Jesuit Refugee Services (JRS) was founded on November 14, 1980 by Fr. Pedro Arrupe, SJ, who was then Superior General of the Society of Jesus, in response to the plight of Vietnamese refugees fleeing their war-ravaged homeland. Superior General Fr. Arturo Sosa, SJ invited the global Jesuit community to participate in JRS Day on November 14, 2020, JRS's 40th Anniversary. The day is meant to "celebrate the women and men whose lives have been changed through JRS, and the generous service of so many lay colleagues, religious and Jesuits over the past 40 years."

Our parish immigration immersion team is teaming up with JRS to help celebrate their 40th anniversary. by participating in their #40miles4refugees campaign. This effort runs through November 14, 2020, designated as JRS Day. The group felt that this a relatively safe action in time of COVID and provides an opportunity to safely join with others, get some exercise, engage in walking meditation, and join with others to support a worthy cause. San Bartolome Sister Parish Update

The St. Joseph – San Bartolome sister parish committees are collaborating to share news from our communities, striving to fortify our fellowship and solidarity. Here is the latest from San Bartolome:

The number of Covid-19 cases thankfully are still low in the communities. Educational workshops are being delivered by volunteers, emphasizing prevention and treatment. Mass is being held at church in-person at a 50% capacity, maintaining safety protocols.

Since March 25, DHP students have largely remained in their homes, except for a few who remain at the student house in San Salvador. Most have continued their studies online; three students discontinued the program. Students are from the communities of Arcatao, Carasque, Nueva Trinidad, Teosinte, Navarrete, Chavarrias, and Sicahuites. They are studying to obtain degrees at the National University and the UCA in a variety of subjects, including: modern languages, sports & recreation, nursing, teaching, social work, chemistry, industrial, mechanical and agronomic engineering, journalism, medicine, psychology, and information systems.

DHP students and coordinators continue to meet regularly as a group online, meanwhile serving locally in their communities. Throughout the time of the pandemic, they have faced the challenges of isolation, uncertainty, and transitioning to studies and work online. Thankfully, there have been no incidents of COVID-19 amongst the students. During these difficult times, they have centered themselves by focusing on family, community, solidarity, and their faith and hope in God.

One Parish One Prisoner Update

The St. Joe's One Parish One Prisoner re-entry support team thanks you for your continuing prayers and material support as we accompany Wes Atkinson as he begins his journey to post-incarceration independence.

There are always challenges when navigating the barriers that our formerly incarcerated neighbors face, but there have been successes, too! Wes has permanent housing in King County, a phone, a computer, and several months' worth of bus passes. We are currently helping him look for a sustainable job, as well as moving state legal and social services paperwork forward. Some days are better than others, of course, but everyone is committed to Wes' physical and emotional well-being.

We ask that you continue to pray for Wes, and if you are able, donate Fred Meyer gift cards or cash to One Parish One Prisoner. We are also looking for recommendations for mental health professionals who would be able to help Wes continue to make strides towards independence as he leaves the mental confines of prison behind.

Why We Are Installing Say Their Names at St. Joe's: A Message from the Parish Anti-Racism Committee

Next week, the St. Joseph Parish Anti-Racism Committee will be installing a sign memorial on the northeast lawn of St. Joseph church. This is the Say Their Names project – thirty signs with the names of thirty people killed by Seattle police in the past ten years. Each sign has been decorated by an individual or family.

We wanted to explain the context and history of this project, and express our desire for dialogue about this sensitive issue.

Earlier this year, Immaculate Conception Parish, Seattle's historically Black Catholic parish, created the original Say Their Names installation. Immaculate Conception then invited each parish in the South Seattle Deanery to follow suit.

The St. Joseph Parish Anti-Racism Committee, under the umbrella of the Faith Justice Commission, discerned for many weeks about this project. There was unanimous consensus that this project was a worthwhile public witness about the sanctity of all life, and an opportunity to stand in solidarity (a core tenet of Catholic Social Teaching) with our Black sisters and brothers in their fight against injustice.

Let us be clear. We are fully aware that some of the people whose names are on these signs were engaged in violent and dangerous activities. However, we believe in the Catholic doctrine that all life is sacred, and that killing, especially without trial or due process, is a result of disordered systems. We cannot accept a system that leads to the death of so many of our sisters and brothers, a disproportionate number of them Black, all loved by God and deserving of life.

This project is also not about demeaning police officers. Instead, it is a call to reform systems that facilitate extrajudicial killings, and to push for policies that encourage de-escalation and non-violent means of resolving issues. As Ngozi Oleru of Immaculate Conception explained, "this is not about the police. This is about a system of fairness being administered equally to all. The issue we are addressing is not what an individual may have done or not done, but the issue of structural and institutionalized discrimination because of someone's skin color or origin. That is what the conversation should be about."

This project is a call for reconciliation, peace, and dialogue. Any member of the committee would be happy to discuss this further with any member of the parish – a respectful community conversation is indeed our goal.

May we bring the poor and marginalized to the polls with us;

the hungry, the homeless, the prisoners, the refugees, and the immigrants.

from the child in the womb to the child at our borders.

May we bring the sick who need health care;

and those suffering from Covid-19.

May we bring all of God's creation to the polls;

the endangered animals, the forests, and non-renewables.

May we bring the dignity of workers to the polls;

people's right to unions, fair work and fair pay.

Remind us we cannot serve two masters, God and money;

may our taxes go to the common good.

Remind us that all human rights come from you.

Remind us that the health of our nation comes from how we respond;

to our love of God and our love of neighbor for the building of the kingdom.

God we ask you;

bring peace, healing and reconciliation of all injustices to our nation.


May we continue to believe in liberty and justice for all.
