

# Community Spotlight Racial Justice Book Group: Reflections

On the eve of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, we're publishing some reflections from members of the St. Joe's Racial Justice Book Group. This week, group member Jackie Mann reflects on two recent reads, *Racial Justice in the Catholic Church* by Brian Massingale, and *Me and White Supremacy* by Layla Saad:


Brian Massingale, in *Racial Justice and the Catholic Church*, emphasizes that, to create positive change, we need to move from crisis management to mission integrity. Compassion is required for the authentic crossover to racial solidarity--we must experience sympathy, empathy, and autopathy (personally feel the pain). Massingale emphasized that we have much to learn and to un-learn about our racial and racist history. As Malcolm X once said, "Untruths have to be untold." We must learn history with the awareness that historical ignorance is not accidental. "The truth will set you free, but first it will make you miserable." Massingale also emphasizes that the Church's decisions inform us, but the Church does not decide for us.

Layla Saad, in *Me and White Supremacy* and related writings, shares the revelation that, going forward, she is making the intentional choice to de-center her business on whiteness: "I will not cater my writing or focus my work on the white gaze. The gaze will be my own. I will write for myself, as a black woman, and to black women and women of color. And any benefit or inspiration that white people gain from my work will be a side-effect or unintended consequence." Given that the "unintentional default in most online businesses is that whiteness is centered," these changes to her business are not only risky, but empowering, and likely most positively impactful. Ms. Saad's book and other writings are strong, informed, and moving.



### **First Reading**

### Sister Parish Updates: Scholarships and a New Home!

For the past twenty years, St. Joe's has supported college students from our sister parish in San Bartolomé, El Salvador, through the DHP scholarship program. DHP (*desarollo humano popular*, loosely meaning "Popular Human Development",) raises funds to send local students to college and vocational schools. With help from the DHP program, over the past 20 years, 71 students have graduated with college degrees, including 19 in Technology, 14 in Education, 5 in Engineering, and 33 with BAs. The DHP scholarship is meant for the community as much as the individual student. Scholarship students bring their knowledge back to help improve their community in the form of 100 hours of community service their field of specialization. Once they are employed after graduation, they agree to donate 5% of their income for five years back to the DHP scholarship fund. Recipients are encouraged to participate on the DHP committee for two years after graduation, and many do. (For more info, and a link to donate, click <a href="here">here</a>.)

Thanks to the extreme generosity of the St. Joe's community, DHP was able to raise enough money to purchase a house for the DHP students in San Salvador. No more uncertainty about housing, or anxiety about meeting rent each month. The single-story house has 5 bedrooms and 2 bathrooms, a fully-equipped kitchen and laundry, family room, large hall, dining room, a nice garden, and a two-car garage. It is in a safe neighborhood, close to bus lines, shops, and restaurants, only a 5-minute bus ride to the university campus, or about a 10-minute walk. This is wonderful news – thanks to you all who made this life-changing purchase possible for our friends in El Salvador. Click here for a video tour of the home.

DHP is currently raising funds to support their students over the coming year. St. Joe's has already fulfilled over half of its donation pledge for the year (\$13,000), but we still have a few thousand dollars to make up. 



### **2021 Stewardship Pledges**

A reminder that this year, we introduced the Rollover Method. This approach provided the opportunity for you to simply "rollover" your pledge from last year to next year without having to submit a pledge card, unless you wanted to increase or decrease your pledge. If you have not yet submitted a pledge card or have other changes, we will enter your pledge the same as 2020. Thank you for your ongoing support of St. Joseph Parish.

### **Parishioners Helping Parishioners**

As we begin the new year, it is impossible to think back on 2020 without thinking about all of the ways our lives have changed since the beginning of the pandemic. Lockdowns, surges, and now, thank God, a vaccine – it's all become a part of our daily lives. Many of us are fortunate enough to be able to weather a lockdown, but for medically and economically vulnerable folks, it's not that simple. Even doing a simple load of laundry becomes difficult, if not impossible, if you're stuck inside and you don't have a washing machine!

The St. Joe's community realized this very early on in the pandemic, and, true to your generous nature, got to work. In March, right after lockdown began, Pastoral Assistant for Stewardship Mary Wiseman organized a Parishioner-to-Parishioner Buddy System group, pairing volunteers with folks in the community who needed support. From dog walking to grocery shopping to laundry to Thanksgiving dinners, St. Joe's volunteers have made sure that no one is left unsupported during the pandemic.

Once a need is identified, staff send an email to the list of volunteers to see who can help, based on neighborhood and availability. Currently, forty volunteers are helping about twenty parishioners, in addition to phone check-ins and sending out paper bulletins to seventy people who do not have access the internet.
