

Exciting News from Nurturing Roots

Even though it's winter, Nurturing Roots is gearing up for the growing season! They need greenhouse protection for new veggie starts, and the St. Joe's community has stepped up to help.

A new 8' x 20', virtually unbreakable, polycarbonate greenhouse has been ordered for the urban farm, and the two smaller damaged greenhouses have been evaluated to begin repairs. On-site volunteers from all over the Seattle community are filling starter pots with soil, ready to plant and tuck into the newly constructed and repaired greenhouses.

Produce gown in these greenhouses will supply their give-away program in the Rainier Valley. Starts and seeds will fill the 150+ grow boxes they plan to distribute this spring/summer.

St. Joe's has dedicated outreach funds set aside ("restricted funds") to support this project. Your contributions to the parish general fund allow us to use these restricted funds, and support parish staff who are working on creating these community connections.

As always, Nurturing Roots appreciates volunteer hours – <u>stop by on Sundays between 11am and 3pm.</u>

Join us on Zoom on Wed. Feb. 16th at 7pm to learn about the Nurturing Roots greenhouse and the many ways we can be "Building community through farming, healing community through relationships." For the Zoom link, or any questions, contact Deacon Steve at stevew@stjosephparish.org

Nurturing Roots is a community farming program located on South Beacon Hill, focusing on environmental justice, access to education, and re-engaging people, especially young people of color, with the environment.






Deuteronomy 18:15-20







The Life of an Artist in Arcatao

As a young girl, Isabel Orellana remembers spending long nights in the Salvadorean heat giggling and

drawing alongside her younger sister. The lush green forestry and tall jagged mountainsides offered an escape of frolicking adventures spilling onto the page of cartoons and caricatures. Tall tales from her sister offered additional inspiration and a different perspective on a passion which continued to build into a career for Isabel Orellana in the town or Arcatao, El Salvador.

Isabel is a member of the San Bartolomé community and is part of the DHP scholarship program in El Salvador. We had the opportunity to have a conversation with her recently and learn a bit more about her background, career, and her involvement in the San Bartolomé community.

Isabel was born and grew up in Nueva Trinidad, a neighboring community to Arcatao in Chalatenango. She comes from a large family with eleven siblings and her mom and dad. She is the youngest one and is now an aunt to six boys and girls. When asked about Arcatao and the local community, Isabel describes it as "hospitable, welcoming, especially with visitors...we are always looking out for each other and always willing to help each other out."

Isabel started to be involved with the church community at a young age, following her father's footsteps as he held and continues to be a "Delegado de la Palabra" (delegate of the Word). Isabel always looks forward to local festivities such as the annual celebrations of the "Virgen de Candelaria" (Saint Candelaria), which happens in February as well as celebrations of San Bartolomé, at the end



of August. The festivities include Masses, dancing, and music.

Isabel quickly stands out from a lot of the younger generation in El Salvador with her decision to pursue art as her career. It is rare for children to get an opportunity to go to high school in El Salvador and

even less likely an opportunity to go to college. If the opportunity does come parents and students alike are always considering the 'safer' career paths of: law, accounting, medical school, engineering, etc. as the way to go as these paths tend to have a better outlook in terms of job opportunities and pay. However, Isabel stayed true to her passion and even had the support of her parents to have art become her career. In fact, Isabel is now close to completing her bachelor's degree at the University of El Salvador in San Salvador, with a specialty in painting.

Isabel's art is focused on the environment, taking care of the Earth and the resources it provides to all of us. She is inspired by artists like Nils Udo, Konstantin Razumov, Claudia Monet, and Iliana Perinat; all representing different art techniques including contemporary art, painting, and impressionism. Isabel hopes one day she will be able to exhibit her art at national and international galleries. In the meantime, she is focused on finishing her studies at the University and works with an Italian organization in El Salvador called "Soleterre" to provide local art workshops to kids in rural areas.

Isabel is so appreciative and thankful for the opportunity she has had as a result of the DHP program to be able to study art and the support she has received from San Bartolome and St. Joseph's communities. The experiences she has had as a result have made a mark in her life that will never be forgotten.


St. Francis House Update & Donation Opportunity

The Year of St. Joseph

Liturgy Notes by Katy Houston, MAPS

On December 8th, 2020, Pope Francis released the apostolic letter *Patris Corde*, "With a Father's Heart," on the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. The Pope then proclaimed a "Year of Saint Joseph" to run until December 8th, 2021.

This is a special year, then, for our Parish of St. Joseph. And, the proclamation of the "Year of St. Joseph" is particularly relevant for our time of COVID. One portion of the letter than really struck me was this: Joseph's spiritual path "is not one that explains, but accepts" — which does not mean that he is "resigned." Instead, he is "courageously and firmly proactive," because with "Holy Spirit's gift of fortitude," and full of hope, he is able "to accept life as it is, with all its contradictions, frustrations and disappointments." I think that resonates with many of us!

The Arts and Environment team have arranged for Julie Olsen to create an icon of St. Joseph, with the Child Jesus to display from March 19, the feast of St. Joseph to the end of the proclaimed year.

Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. To you God entrusted his only Son; in you Mary placed her trust; with you Christ became man.

Dear Friends,

Thank you! All good things start with gratitude and we are so grateful to be part of a reasonable, conscientious, loving community. St. Joe's has done the right thing during this long crisis of pandemic – valuing health and well-being as we extend the love of Christ.

Part of slowly reopening Masses to in-person attendance requires us to remind everyone that our doing so <u>does not</u> <u>signal that the danger is past</u>. Far from it. With some new strains of the virus out appearing in our state, and the scientific community only now being given full authority to manage this crisis, we need to remain vigilant.

Gathering for the Eucharist provides for very real pastoral need of many, who rightly rely on the Sacrament and the visible Body of Christ gathered to sustain us and continually reorient our lives on Christ. But each and every one of us must continue to engage our own personal responsibility, not only to keep our fellow parishioners safe, but also to keep the larger community safe as well.

Following all the guidelines is no guarantee that you will avoid getting infected, but doing so will help mitigate the risk to you and others. Stay home and stay safe as much as possible, avoid any gatherings if you have underlying health conditions, and *get the vaccine as soon as possible*. However, even if you have been fully vaccinated, you still need to follow all the Covid guidelines for now. The Covid vaccines protect people from becoming seriously ill, but so far there is not enough information to know if it is possible to become an asymptomatic carrier following vaccination. (See this website for an FAQ on the vaccine rollout: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/faq.html) Therefore, even if you have been vaccinated, you will still be required to mask, use hand sanitizer, and maintain social distancing while at St. Joe's.

Thank you! All good things end in gratitude and we at St. Joe's are so grateful for how our community has remained steadfast throughout the pandemic. Members continue to actively support one another and parish operations. We will get through this, together (and hopefully soon!).

Again, please do not come to in-person Masses if you have any risk of having been exposed, have any underlying health conditions, or if wearing a mask and being vigilant about physical distancing is difficult for you.



REFLECTING ON FEBRUARY'S READINGS AND HOLIDAYS

There are wonderful stories this month from the Gospels and Old Testament that can help us prepare for our Lenten practice of Praying, Fasting and Giving. You might like to use a children's Bible to read the stories together. The illustrations and background information will help children understand and visualize the text.

Feb 7: *Jesus cures the sick.* **Mark 1:29-39.** Do you know someone who is sick? Say a prayer for them. Send them a card or a picture to cheer them up.

Feb. 14: *Jesus cures a leper and tells him to tell no one.* Mark 1:40-45. Talk about why Jesus would heal a man quietly and not want praise or a reward for healing him. As we get ready for Lent, pray for or help someone quietly without needing a thank you or reward.

Feb. 14: Feast of St. Valentine This kind, third century physician was known for healing a blind girl and marrying young lovers. He is the patron saint of epilepsy, beekeeping and lovers. You might like to read more about him in the book <u>Saint Valentine by Robert Sabuda</u>, available at the Seattle Public Library.



Feb. 15 is Presidents' Day where we honor important leaders in our nation's history. Did you know that President Biden is Catholic? The last (and first) Catholic President was John F. Kennedy!

"My Catholic faith drilled into me a core truth – that every person on earth is equal in rights and dignity, because we are all beloved children of God... Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17, marks the beginning of Lent, 40 special days before Easter that Christians use to "Fast, Pray and Give." Jesus spent 40 days in the desert and during that time he fasted and prayed as he prepared for his ultimate act of giving. He gave himself to the suffering of the cross for our sakes. We want to be followers of Jesus and so, like him, we "Fast, Pray and Give" during Lent. On Ash Wednesday, the priest places ashes in the shape of a cross on our foreheads and reminds us to "Repent and Believe in the Gospel." The ashes come from the palms from last year's Palm Sunday. We may not all be able to receive ashes in person this year, but we can still "examine" or think about how we can be closer to Jesus. Draw a picture of yourself and include ashes on your forehead.

Feb. 21: *Noah and the Promise of the Rainbow.* **Genesis 9:8.** God has promised that he will always love us. What promises do you make? *Jesus' 40 days of temptation in the desert.* **Mark 1:12-15.** What is a temptation? Can you share a way that you fight temptation? Lent is a good time to practice fighting temptation.

Feb. 28: "If God is for us who can be against us." Romans 8. Have you ever felt picked on or that someone is against you? When you feel this way can you tell God about it? Can you share a way that God has shown you that He loves you?
