
Stewardship Corner

Dear friends,

It's hard to believe that it is already February! Soon it will be Lent, which means that Spring is just around the corner. In these times of hope and new life, I'm writing to you, our faithful and dedicated parishioners, with two big ideas on my mind.

I would also like to keep you fully informed about our parish's financial status, as we finish the first half of our fiscal year. While this column won't get "into the weeds" of our financial picture, we always strive towards total transparency, and you are always welcome to contact me with questions about specifics! As of the start of 2021, the parish is currently down about \$145,000 in ordinary income, compared to what we had budgeted at the beginning of the fiscal year. This is to be expected, as the economy as a whole has shrunk in a similar respect, so we are not panicked. However, it does mean that we must continue to strive to keep the parish in a healthy financial state.

We are extremely fortunate to have Marti McGaughey, Pastoral Assistant for Administration, on staff. She has examined every aspect of our budget to determine where we can cut expenses, and as of now, she expects to be able to cut the budget expenses by \$75,000 by the end of the fiscal year (none of this comes at the expense of jobs or outreach to the poor – most of these savings are the result of wise operational changes). This, in combination with Paycheck Protection Program money received in August (which, while originally a loan, should be fully forgiven), will help us maintain a positive cashflow.

Although we do have some savings for emergencies and other unforeseen needs, it is only prudent to maintain a balance of reserves to ensure our financial solvency and stability. While we are in a good place, considering the scale of the pandemic, we cannot let our guard down when it comes to stewarding our financial resources.

If you are able to give, please do. Your gifts to St. Joe's not only keep the lights on and the heat working, but also allow staff like Deacon Steve, Theresa, Claire, and others to continue to serve the spiritual and material needs of our community. There is a direct causal effect between what you give today and the programs we are able to sponsor through the coming

Finally, let us continue to pray for each other. I pray that God's peace be upon you and your families as we move closer to worshipping together as a parish family.

The Year of St. Joseph

Liturgy Notes by Katy Houston, MAPS

On December 8th, 2020, Pope Francis released the apostolic letter *Patris Corde*, "With a Father's Heart," on the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. The Pope then proclaimed a "Year of Saint Joseph" to run until December 8th, 2021.

This is a special year, then, for our Parish of St. Joseph. And, the proclamation of the "Year of St. Joseph" is particularly relevant for our time of COVID. One portion of

the letter than really struck me was this: Joseph's spiritual path "is not one that explains, but accepts" — which does not mean that he is "resigned." Instead, he is "courageously and firmly proactive," because with "Holy Spirit's gift of fortitude," and full of hope, he is able "to accept life as it is, with all its contradictions, frustrations and disappointments." I think that resonates with many of us!

The Arts and Environment team are working with an artist to create an icon of St. Joseph, with the Child Jesus to display from March 19, the feast of St. Joseph, to the end of the proclaimed year.

Dear Friends,

Thank you! All good things start with gratitude and we are so grateful to be part of a reasonable, conscientious, loving community. St. Joe's has done the right thing during this long crisis of pandemic – valuing health and well-being as we extend the love of Christ.

Part of slowly reopening Masses to in-person attendance requires us to remind everyone that our doing so <u>does not</u> <u>signal that the danger is past</u>. Far from it. With some new strains of the virus out appearing in our state, and the scientific community only now being given full authority to manage this crisis, we need to remain vigilant.

Gathering for the Eucharist provides for very real pastoral need of many, who rightly rely on the Sacrament and the visible Body of Christ gathered to sustain us and continually reorient our lives on Christ. But each and every one of us must continue to engage our own personal responsibility, not only to keep our fellow parishioners safe, but also to keep the larger community safe as well.

Following all the guidelines is no guarantee that you will avoid getting infected, but doing so will help mitigate the risk to you and others. Stay home and stay safe as much as possible, avoid any gatherings if you have underlying health conditions, and *get the vaccine as soon as possible*. However, even if you have been fully vaccinated, you still need to follow all the Covid guidelines for now. The Covid vaccines protect people from becoming seriously ill, but so far there is not enough information to know if it is possible to become an asymptomatic carrier following vaccination. (See this website for an FAQ on the vaccine rollout: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/faq.html) Therefore, even if you have been vaccinated, you will still be required to mask, use hand sanitizer, and maintain social distancing while at St. Joe's.

Thank you! All good things end in gratitude and we at St. Joe's are so grateful for how our community has remained steadfast throughout the pandemic. Members continue to actively support one another and parish operations. We will get through this, together (and hopefully soon!).

Again, please do not come to in-person Masses if you have any risk of having been exposed, have any underlying health conditions, or if wearing a mask and being vigilant about physical distancing is difficult for you.



REFLECTING ON FEBRUARY'S READINGS AND HOLIDAYS

There are wonderful stories this month from the Gospels and Old Testament that can help us prepare for our Lenten practice of Praying, Fasting and Giving. You might like to use a children's Bible to read the stories together. The illustrations and background information will help children understand and visualize the text.

Feb 7: *Jesus cures the sick.* **Mark 1:29-39.** Do you know someone who is sick? Say a prayer for them. Send them a card or a picture to cheer them up.

Feb. 14: *Jesus cures a leper and tells him to tell no one.* **Mark 1:40-45.** Talk about why Jesus would heal a man quietly and not want praise or a reward for healing him. As we get ready for Lent, pray for or help someone quietly without needing a thank you or reward.

Feb. 14: Feast of St. Valentine This kind, third century physician was known for healing a blind girl and marrying young lovers. He is the patron saint of epilepsy, beekeeping and lovers. You might like to read more about him in the book **Saint Valentine by Robert Sabuda**, available at the Seattle Public Library.



Feb. 15 is Presidents' Day where we honor important leaders in our nation's history. Did you know that President Biden is Catholic? The last (and first) Catholic President was John F. Kennedy!

Ash Wednesday, Feb. 17, marks the beginning of Lent, 40 special days before Easter that Christians use to "Fast, Pray and Give." Jesus spent 40 days in the desert and during that time he fasted and prayed as he prepared for his ultimate act of giving. He gave himself to the suffering of the cross for our sakes. We want to be followers of Jesus and so, like him, we "Fast, Pray and Give" during Lent. On Ash Wednesday, the priest places ashes in the shape of a cross on our foreheads and reminds us to "Repent and Believe in the Gospel." The ashes come from the palms from last year's Palm Sunday. We may not all be able to receive ashes in person this year, but we can still "examine" or think about how we can be closer to Jesus. Draw a picture of yourself and include ashes on your forehead.

Feb. 21: *Noah and the Promise of the Rainbow.* **Genesis 9:8.** God has promised that he will always love us. What promises do you make? *Jesus' 40 days of temptation in the desert.* **Mark 1:12-15.** What is a temptation? Can you share a way that you fight temptation? Lent is a good time to practice fighting temptation.

Feb. 28: "If God is for us who can be against us." Romans 8. Have you ever felt picked on or that someone is against you? When you feel this way can you tell God about it? Can you share a way that God has shown you that He loves you?
