




### **Confiteor**

### **First Reading**

Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18

God put Abraham to the test. He called to him, "Abraham!" "Here I am!" he replied. Then God said: "Take your son Isaac, your only one, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him up as a holocaust on a height that I will point out to you."

who has spoken through the prophets.



### **Community News: Vegan Meals to the Streets**

Over the last two months, there has been a flurry of activity in the parish social hall kitchen. But it's not coffee and donuts after Mass, or banquet meals for school functions – it's a small group of local cooks, gathered by a St. Joe's parishioner, who have been hard at work cooking healthy meals to distribute to our houseless friends.

Vegan Meals to the Streets is a grassroots, local project that seeks to provide a meaningful, earth-friendly presence in Seattle by providing healthy, sustainably-sourced and packaged meals and necessities to those in need around the community.

In June, St. Joe's School alum John Kennedy and Crystal Rainbow Mort began preparing organic, healthy meals in his home kitchen once a week and distributing them to houseless neighbors around the





city. They cultivated relationships with vendors at the West Seattle Farmer's Market, who in turn donated pounds and pounds of organic produce that the VMS crew turns into soups, sandwiches, salads, and other delicious meals. They also found a partner with a 501(c)3 non-profit to facilitate organization. Soon, the relatable, tangible nature of this type of outreach attracted volunteers, and the operation quickly outgrew John's kitchen.

Since the social hall kitchen wasn't being used (the pandemic has shut down most of St. Joe's church and school social functions), it was a perfect fit for Vegan Meals to the Streets. With a bigger space and professional-grade equipment, they've been able to prepare and distribute 1000 meals in their five weeks at St. Joe's – over 5,000 since the beginning of VMS.

"Access to a commercial style kitchen has helped us in ways we hadn't even anticipated," says Milly Ayotte, one of the VMS chefs. "The kitchen has enabled us to adopt better protocols for health and food safety. Most importantly, the kitchen has allowed us to warm up and serve a large number of meals while still hot."

After food prep and cook-

ing at the beginning of the week, the team fills up their cars with hot individual meals (in compostable clamshell containers) and heads to encampments around the city. At first, says John, they just went to where they knew folks needed help. "We just pulled up to wherever people were camping, opened the trunk, and asked if anyone wanted lunch. Eventually, we've developed a network of friends – they tell us where the greatest need is around the city, and we go there."

It's a holistic way of engaging in mutual aid (not charity, the cooks reminded us!). "Everyone deserves a hot, healthy, nutritious meal," Milly and John explain. "And there's no reason that we

can't create and serve these meals in a way that doesn't harm the planet as a whole. This city is very eco-conscious, but sometimes we leave those priorities behind in the rush to help under-resourced individuals in our community. It doesn't haven't to be an either-or. It can be a both-and!"

Though the residency at St. Joe's social hall kitchen might be temporary, VMS plans on cooking and serving food long into the future. If you'd like to help them find a permanent home, get in touch! The team is also looking for cooking and distribution volunteers, especially folks with admin, accounting, photography, or social media skills. In addition to services, VMS is issuing a general call for winterproofing items such as tents, tarps, blankets, towels, socks, gloves, hats, and jackets.

While VMS is founded on healthy meals, their vision doesn't stop at food, and believe that justice extends to housing. "We respect the power of a hot meal to make a meaningful impact, and also understand this only scratches the surface of what is needed to bring all our community mem-



bers to a state of security and wellbeing," they say. "As we learn from our neighbors impacted by cold and wet conditions, we want to focus on providing sustainable ways to lend a hand to our neighbors as we advocate for long-term housing solutions."

The VMS crew offered a word of thanks to the parish: "We want to extend our profound thanks to the St. Joseph community. It is hard to imagine a more nourishing way of fostering connection than following the ancient tradition of offering love and support in the form of a warm meal on a cold winter day. These invaluable gifts we in turn pass on to our neighbors, reinforcing wellness and our fundamental connection to one another as human beings."

### **Nurturing Roots: Make a Veggie Starter Pot for Lent!**

Down at the Nurturing Roots Urban Farm, St. Joe's parishioners have been hard at work helping to get it ready for spring, donating pots, seeds, expertise, and time. The new greenhouse is almost ready for plant racks and veggie starts! Now is your chance, during this Lenten season, to fill the greenhouse with love and support. Everyone is invited to begin a Veggie "Start Pot" right now to donate at the end of Lent.

See below for instructions. During week following the school's Easter vacation, we will have a series of day/times when you can deliver your start(s) to Nurturing Roots Farm or St. Joe's (which we will deliver to the farm).

#### **Materials:**

- one 4" pot (with hole in bottom to release water)
- small amount of organic soil
- one small package of organic, non-GMO seeds of veggies—lettuce, carrots, tomatoes, beets, or zucchini
- a sunny window

#### **Steps:**

- 1. Fill 4" pot three-fourths full with organic soil.
- 2. Lay 3 seeds on top of the soil and cover with quarter-inch of organic soil.
- 3. Place pot on plate or lid to protect surface from water, and place in sunny window.
- 4. Water gently about every 1-3 days, when soil becomes dry to the touch. Soil should be moist, but not soggy.
- 5. Once seeds germinate, thin the shoots to give them room to grow.
- 6. Think of the color your plant will add to the farm and the joy your fresh vegetable will bring to someone's life.


Opportunity to Help a Local Family

### **Reflections on Lent**

Our English word Lent is a shortened form of the Old English word *lencten,* meaning "lengthen" describing the lengthening of days in spring...at least in the Northern Hemisphere. One year, I experienced the end of Lent in Australia, where it was the beginning of fall! It is clear that the ancient meanings of words may be overlooked by present reality.

The Season of Lent goes back a very long way in our church history. It is generally believed that the season was created at the Council of Nicea in 325 AD, and the count of 40 days varies slightly in Christian traditions. But the symbolism of 40 is strong. Think of all the uses of "40 days" in our salvation history.

Our environment and liturgy during Lent help us to contemplate this time of preparation for the great Feast of Easter. The flowers are put aside and bare branches—that will gradually blossom as we grow closer to Easter—take their place. Images of bare branches will fill the walls and remind us of the desert time that Lent calls us to experience. The color of vestments is purple, a sign of repentance.



### **Stewardship Corner with Mary Wiseman**

Lent is here, and as we wait in hope of the Resurrection, and grateful for the signs of spring, I wanted to share with you brief but important update on the state of our parish finances. The total year-to-date (fiscal year) income is \$1,094,165, and the amount that we budgeted for, year-to-date, was \$1,164,794.82. This leaves us at a shortfall of \$70,628. These numbers are no reason to panic, and indeed, not bad for a pandemic! However, as we continue to be good stewards of your finances, I wanted to keep you updated with the trends and some context behind the numbers.

The budget shortfall is easily explained by the amount donated by visitors at Mass in year before the pandemic. Last fiscal year, we received over \$50,000 of these gifts, compared to just over \$3,000 this current year. We hope that, with increased numbers of parishioners (only if it is safe, of course), over time we will be able to reduce the deficit. As always, if you are in a position to give an additional gift, any amount would be appreciated: Your gifts allow us to keep the lights on, the heat working, the livestream online, but also funds the many important spiritual and material services that St. Joe's provides to the community.

#### THE MAGIS FAMILY FORMATION PROJECT

March 2021

The Magis is a family faith sharing guide with a "menu" of options for parents and children to pick readings and/or activities to do together, especially during Covid-19. March's theme is **Preparing for Jesus' Resurrection**, corresponding with Lent and our anticipation of Easter.

In this issue you'll see different ways your family can engage with the CRS Rice Bowl

program, which is an at-home Catholic Family Project of education, prayer, fasting, and charitable giving for Lent. During the 40 days of Lent, CRS invites us to reflect on how hunger and malnutrition affect our human family, and on the need to take action to end this global injustice. #### **LENTEN FAMILY REFLECTIONS**

March 7: Third Sunday of Lent. Gospel: John 2:13-25

<sup>1</sup>Jesus drives out the moneychangers from the Temple and says that he will destroy the temple and raise it up again.

- What are some places that we believe are holy? (churches, shrines, altars, the tabernacle)
- What makes a place holy? (A place is holy because we experience God's presence there.)
- What do we do at holy places? (pray, reflect, meditate)
- Talk about places and times when you have experienced God's presence. After his Resurrection, Jesus' disciples understood that Jesus was present with them as they gathered to pray and especially when they gathered to share a meal. Jesus teaches us in today's Gospel that he is God's presence with us. Thank God for Jesus' presence with us, especially in the Sacrament of the Eucharist







Each Friday of Lent, Catholics abstain from eating meat as a way to experience a little of the hunger that many experience daily. Journey with us around the world to see stories of hope and incorporate Lenten recipes into your meatless Fridays.
