



First Reading

St. VINCENT DE PAUL

St. Vincent de Paul Society: Caring for Our Neighbors, Part 2

The St. Joe's Conference of St. Vincent de Paul, our local chapter of the international aid organization, has been busy helping our neighbors on Capitol Hill and around Seattle cope with the economic hardships that the pandemic has brought. We're highlighting stories of Vincentians finding innovative ways to connect with clients during this time of lockdown, and ways that you can help!

Beth Newman is the Spiritual Advisor for the St. Joe's SVdP Conference, and helps the team stay grounded spiritually while they focus on helping our neighbors. She started volunteering with SVdP eleven years ago, inspired by her husband's family, who have been involved with SVdP for over 25 years. "I feel like it's an honoring of the love of family, while caring for the community."

As the group's Spiritual Advisor, Beth prepares and leads meditations and reflections that begin each meeting. Right now, they are reading a biography of Frederick Ozanam, the founder of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. The discussions about the intersection of spirituality and charitable work have been energizing. "We have such a range of folks involved," Beth says. "It's wonderful to walk with people who have been working with SVdP for 40 years, or just a few months. We bring together the identity of the Society, of our patron saint, the readings from Sunday, the readings from the year, and how we can live those out serving our neighbors."

"St. Vincent's isn't just another social agency – we are a small spirituality group that then goes out and cares for people in our community," Beth explains. "We're very simple as far as our mission is concerned. We're called to love God and love our neighbor – to see the face of God in our neighbor. It breaks open your world in a really beautiful way. It starts to change you. You're able to care for your family better, and engage with people you run into on the street. It changes how you move through the world."

Your donations to St. Vincent de Paul aren't just a gift of money. Donations represent the care that we have for one another, and a recognition of the inherent dignity of all people. "I tell folks, when we them something simple and tangible, like gift cards, that this is a sign that the community loves you, and cares for you. We want you here. We want you to be our neighbor."

While SVdP continues to be good stewards of your donations – every dollar goes directly to our neighbors in need – the next month is critical. As the <u>end of a statewide moratorium on evictions</u> draws near, King County could see record numbers of people forced out of their homes. SVdP is ready to assist with rent, but needs our support.

SVdP has recently secured a \$20,000 matching gift – every dollar donated, until \$20,000 has been reached, will be matched 1-to-1. If you are able, now is the time to invest in our community and donate to St. Vincent de Paul.

The Scrutinies, Part 2

The Gospel readings for these three Sundays are a very ancient connection to the Scrutinies. We hear the story of Jesus and the Samaritan Woman at the Well, and the elect are asked to consider for what they thirst. We hear the story of the One Born Blind, and the elect consider what in them is blind to God's Love. The story of Lazarus asks the elect what binds them and keeps them from growing closer to Christ. These are questions for all of us to consider on our faith journey.

March 14, the fourth Sunday of Lent is *Laetare* Sunday. This Sunday gets its name from the first few words (Incipit) of the traditional Latin entrance (Introit) for the Mass of the day. "Laetare Jerusalem" ("Rejoice, O Jerusalem") is from Isaiah 66:10. For this day of rejoicing in the middle of the penitential season of Lent, the vestments and altar cloth change to pink.

March 19 is the Feast of St. Joseph. Pope Francis has designated 2021 as the Year of St. Joseph, Patron of the Universal Church. We are remembering the Namesake of our Parish with a special prayer card that will be available in the church foyer. The image on the card was created by parishioner Eleana Pawl. Please feel free to take cards for those who may not be able to visit the church.



One Parish One Prisoner Update

As we enter into Lent, the St. Joe's <u>One Parish One Prisoner</u> team has been reflecting on the past six months with Wes Atkinson, our friend whom we have been accompanying since his release from prison last fall, and some of the things we've learned on the journey so far.

First of all, we'd like to sincerely thank all of you who donated clothes, food, and gift cards for Wes when he moved into transitional housing in August. Your generosity made all the difference – in almost every conversation, he mentions how much the support of the parish meant to him, and how the material assistance kept him from having to resort to old habits that lead to recidivism. Thank you!

It has been an up-and-down journey, as the team learned along with Wes how to navigate the post-release system in Washington State. We are thrilled to report that Wes now has as full-time job, and is living on his own, having moved out of congregate transitional housing. This is a huge achievement, and speaks to Wes' perseverance.

In addition to spiritual and emotional accompaniment, the parish agreed to pay for the first three months of Wes' rent, as well as help him secure Apple Health and Department of Health and Human Services benefits. Though the financial-support phase of accompaniment has ended, the team stays in touch with Wes, and will continue to support him as he moves forward with his life.

We've learned a lot, both about our state's system of incarceration, and about our role in it, these past few

months. While many of us had a fundamental knowledge of the inequities of the system, especially in terms of disproportionately incarcerating Black and Brown people, we didn't fully understand the lasting effects of incarceration.

We saw firsthand how the system is set up for previously-incarcerated citizens to fail. Recidivism is most often not a personal failing, but a predictable and preventable result of policies, rules, and stigma that keep folks from finding meaningful employment and safe, affordable housing. Helping one friend on his journey through the "Underground" (as the One Parish One Prisoner program calls it) is important, but it is a band-aid for widespread policy failure, and we find ourselves even more committed to righting the wrongs of decades of politics that overly punish the most vulnerable among us.

The team is currently discerning if and when to accompany a new incarcerated friend. We will continue to keep you, the parish, updated as we walk that journey. In the meantime, we encourage you to learn more about the One Parish One Prisoner program and, if you feel called to join us, get in touch - contact Deacon Steve for more information.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

Did You know? New tax laws and strategies can help you minimize your taxes and maximize your contributions to St. Joseph Parish! Here's how:

- \$300 Charitable Deduction
- Tax-free Transfer IRA Transfer
- Double Tax Reduction from Appreciated Stock

\$300 charitable deduction for non-itemizers

Even if you don't itemize deductions, i.e. use the standard deduction, you can deduct up to \$300 for donations made in cash that are paid directly to the charitable organization. This allows anybody to give, even in a small way, and reap the tax benefit. Online giving is an excellent way to capture a record of those donations.

Tax-free transfer from an IRA

If you are 70½ or older, you can give up to \$100,000 per year tax-free from your IRA to St. Joe's (called a qualified charitable distribution or QCD). The gift counts toward your required minimum distribution (RMD), but isn't included in adjusted gross income. (Donors need not be required to take an RMD now or until age 72, but may still make a QCD. The distribution may be monthly, quarterly or annually. See your account holder for details.)

A double tax reduction by giving appreciated stock

In lieu of sending cash to St. Joe's, you may find greater tax benefits by giving appreciated stock. Holdings owned for more than a year may be deducted based on their value on the date donated. Non-itemizers still benefit from avoiding the capital gains tax on the stock.

THE MAGIS FAMILY FORMATION PROJECT

March 2021

The Magis is a family faith sharing guide with a "menu" of options for parents and children to pick readings and/or activities to do together, especially during Covid-19. March's theme is **Preparing for Jesus' Resurrection**, corresponding with Lent and our anticipation of Easter.

In this issue you'll also see different ways your family can engage with the CRS Rice Bowl

program, which is an at-home Lenten Family Project of education, prayer, fasting, and charitable giving. During the 40 days of Lent, CRS invites us to reflect on how hunger and malnutrition affect our human family, and on the need to take action to end this global injustice. 


LENTEN FAMILY REFLECTIONS

March 14: Fourth Sunday of Lent. Gospel: John 3:14-21

Jesus tells Nicodemus that the Son of Man will be raised up so that those who believe in him will have eternal life.1

- Ask your family to sit for a time in darkness, then light a candle. Invite people to talk about what it felt like to be in the darkness and to compare that to their feelings when the candle was lit. What are we able to see by the limited glow of the candlelight that we couldn't see when we were sitting in darkness?
- Explain that Jesus was the light that came into the world. Our sin causes us to shy away from Jesus, but Lent offers us a chance to remember God's great mercy and the salvation that we have received through Jesus.









Each Friday of Lent, Catholics abstain from eating meat as a way to experience a little of the hunger that many experience daily. Journey with us around the world to see stories of hope and incorporate Lenten recipes into your meatless Fridays. Give the money you saved each week by not eating meat—about \$3 per person per meal—to your CRS Rice Bowl to feed those in need around the world.
