#### Of the Cross and Resurrection

Over 50 years ago—before I had learned how to read, and when the Mass was still in Latin—I used to love to sit in the pews of St. Gregory Church with my mother's missal in my lap, looking at the glossy pictures that decorated this wondrous book, and trying to imagine what they meant. I remember, especially, two images: the first was of a man, chained to a pillar, a cloth wrapped around his waist. Near him, almost hidden in the shadows, were others, who were striking him with whips and cords. And though he was hunched over in pain, his wrists bound to the pillar, I remember his face looking up at me, remember it as though it were before me today, filled with beauty and amazing sorrow.

The second picture that has stuck in my memory was near the back of the book. Where the first seemed black and white, I remember this one had all those pastels from early color movies. Here was the same man, but this time not writhing in pain, but serene and somewhat distant. His right hand was raised in blessing—two fingers up and the thumb beside (almost like the Boy Scout salute)—and his robe hung off him so that one side, where a shining wound was visible, was unclad. He was coming out of a cave, stepping over the threshold, and at his feet two Roman soldiers fell back in fear and wonder. The large stone, beside the entrance, seemed to have been rolled back, and above the cave, two angels sat watching. It was a beautiful picture, but it never grabbed my attention quite as much as the other did. It seemed too much: too many lights, too much power, too boring. I remember, I would always go back to the earlier picture, where the anguished face seemed more interesting to me than the serene countenance exiting the cave.

Many years later, at Eastern Point Retreat House, just outside of Gloucester, Massachusetts—after I had been a Jesuit for a decade and a half—I found myself on a thirty-day silent retreat, encountering again those feelings I had first met when I was only about five years old. This time, however, the images were not in my mother's prayer book, but in my own mind. Yet, still, the attraction to the suffering One was the same, and so was the sense of boredom in the idea of him resurrected.

Throughout this retreat, I recall the sense of God drawing me closer and closer to Jesus, in ways I had not imagined possible. One day, walking along the rocks where the waves were breaking, I found myself reflecting on the preceding 15 years—my whole life as a Jesuit. It came to me that, though I had been faithful and hardworking throughout these years, I had never quite given myself wholly to the call of Christ. I had waffled; I had equivocated; I had, as it were, kept one foot in the door, to prevent it from locking behind me. Even as I thought this, I heard the call to let go, and jump in all the way. And so I did, crying out to the wind, "Okay, you've got me. I am all in." And hearing, as though in response, a small voice in my heart say, "Oh, by the way, did I mention about the Cross?" Thus began my third week of the *Spiritual Exercises*.

In the days that followed, I found myself dragged back into that picture in my mother's missal. Through that harsh grace that sometimes marks a gift of God, I watched the betrayal in the garden, and followed, at a distance, in the long night of trial and judgment. I sat, a small servant in the corner, as the torturers wove their crown and cracked their whip across his back. And each day, I grew more weary and more deeply bound. That face, so twisted and so loving, so unwilling—even as the blood caked across eyebrow and lash-to cry out, as I wanted to, in anger or in condemnation. He bore it, and so I could only watch and marvel, and fall more and more in love with him-for I knew he was doing this so I would not lose heart, that I would not despair. And in him I saw so many I loved—especially my sister, Elizabeth, who seemed to be there, sometimes, changing places with him in the carrying of the Cross or in the hours of torment above the crowd.

In that moment, it came to me: I did not want the Resurrection. This was enough. I realized that I had always looked upon the Resurrection as a kind of reward, given to Jesus for his suffering—a kind of proof that said to the world, "I told you I was God." But to demand such proof seemed sickening to me. As though this death was not enough of a proof of love, was not enough of a sign that he would give anything to me, that I might believe. It seemed clear that to look to the Resurrection was to deny the powerful gift of the Cross—to cheapen this gift by saying it was just a trade, a few hours of torture for an eternity of life. But that is commerce, not love. And this was love—and I did not need anything else to prove its power.

The next evening, exhausted and, in my mind, finished with the retreat, I decided simply to go through the motions for the last three days—doing my prayer, but satisfied that everything, for me, was now accomplished; I needed no more. Like the picture in my mother's missal, the Resurrection held no attraction, but seemed, instead, an overdone dream: a denial of the true love that his death had offered; and, though I accepted it as an article of faith, I wanted no part of it.

In this frame of mind, I bundled up against the October evening and sat to pray along the shore. In my hand, I had a cigar that someone had given me, and I leaned back: content with the night and willing to spend this hour, quietly doing my time.

Then it came, without my seeking it or wanting it, it came: the Resurrection. And I was overwhelmed. It was not a reward for the Cross, not a payback for the hours of torture or the blood that was spilled. It was not some

proof, sent to bring meaning to the sacrifice of Christ. It was just itself. A pure gift, given just because that is what God is: the giver of gifts and of life. What I felt, in that moment, I have no words to explain. It was not the pastel perfection of popular imagery; it was not the whiz-bang of Hollywood; it was just Truth. And in it I felt my father, long dead, and myself, and Jesus, and everything—in a way I cannot describe, but simply knew. And though I could not hold this experience for long, yet, still, I remain certain that, in the Resurrection, nothing of the Cross is lost, but all of it, all of everything, remains. I cannot doubt that, even if I wanted to.

May we all come to know, completely, the gift of God—the love, poured out like water from the Cross, and the unfathomable "Yes" of the Resurrection. Please, God, come again! Alleluia.




The Lord's Prayer




