Doors open 20 minutes before Mass starts. Please arrive early, as attendance is limited to 125 people, and all seating will be first-come, first-seated.



Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Now, Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.





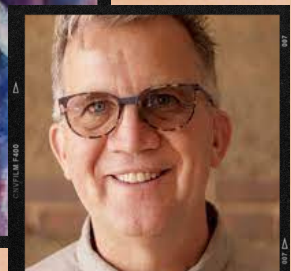

# CHILDREN'S FAITH FORMATION

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## Team Members Needed for Middle School Confirmation

Are you looking to make a difference in the faith life of a teenager at St. Joseph Parish? **Volunteers are needed for the Middle School Confirmation Team**, which will meet about 3 times a month from October through February. The program will be open to students from 7-8th grade and will meet on Sundays afternoons. It will also include a retreat (day) and some service experiences (1/2 day). When you show up in the life of a young person as a mentor in the faith they feel valued and welcomed in the parish but also in the Catholic Church as a whole. Middle schoolers are navigating issues of self-esteem, social and emotional upheaval in their friendship groups and activities, physical changes, rising expectations in school, as well as the challenge to begin forming a mature faith. It is vital that these youth have role models in the faith during these critical times. 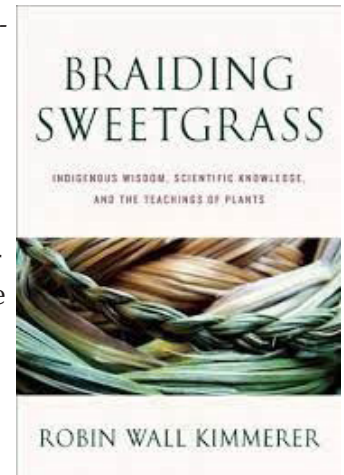
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## Racial Justice Book Group Zoom Meeting – April 14th

Please join us **Wednesday, April 14 at 7pm on Zoom** for a discussion of *Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge and The Teachings of Plants*, by Robin Wall Kimmerer. As a botanist and as a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, the author embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers.

In *Braiding Sweetgrass*, Kimmerer shows that the awakening of a wider ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings are we capable of understanding the generosity of the earth, and learning to give our own gifts in return.

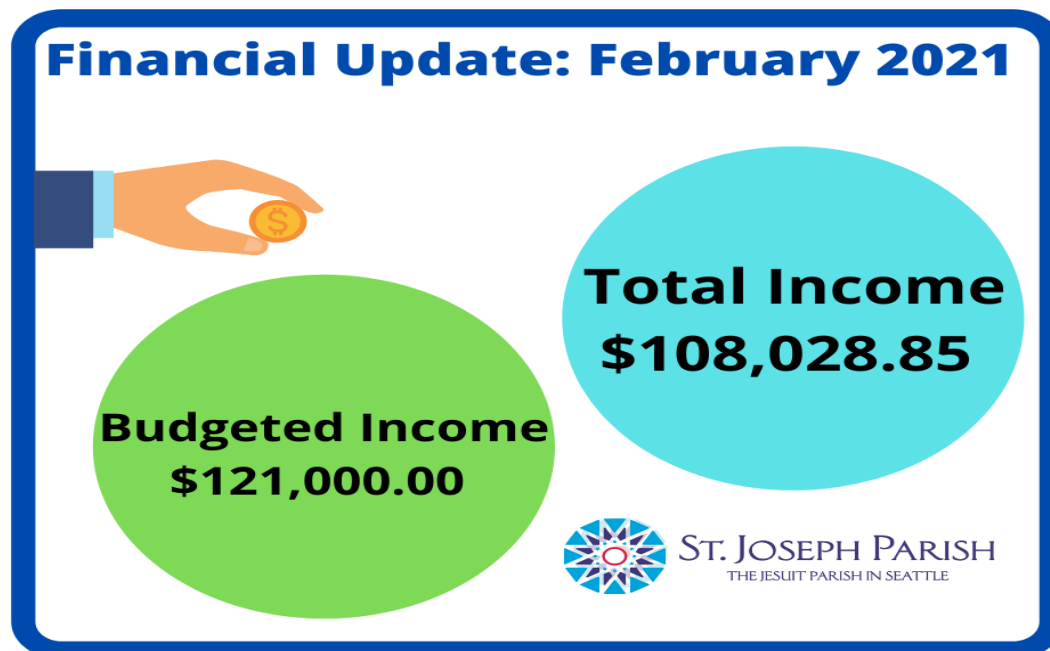

Use the following quotes and conversation starters from each Sunday's readings to reflect on the themes of the Easter season. Invite your kids to talk with you while they color!

**April 4 ~ Corinthians 5: 6-8** *"Clear out the old yeast, so that you may become a fresh batch of dough."*  
Can you forgive someone or forgive yourself in order to start anew?

**April 11 ~ John 20:19-31** *"Jesus said to him, 'Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed.'"*  
It's normal to have doubts. Take courage and try living the faith amidst your doubts.

**April 18 ~ Acts of the Apostles 3:13-15** *"Repent, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be wiped away."*

**April 25 ~ John 3:1-2** *"Beloved, we are God's children now; what we shall be has not yet been revealed."*

## **EASTER-THEMED HANDS-ON ACTIVITIES**

Teach your kids the importance of **renewal and growth** in our Catholic Faith and in the of the Easter season through one of these hands-on activities ...

### **Renewing a Penny**



Gather the following supplies:

- A dirty penny
- a cup
- 1 tsp. salt
- ¼ cup of vinegar

Procedure:

1. With the kids, combine the vinegar and salt in a cup. Drop the dirty penny into the cup and allow it to sit for about five minutes.

2. When you pull the penny out of the cup, you will find the old, dirty penny has been transformed into a clean, shiny penny.
3. Discuss how the penny demonstrates sin in our lives. The dirty penny is like our sin-filled lives, but when we accept Jesus as our Savior and receive His forgiveness, He washes away our sin and we're made "new" – just like the penny!

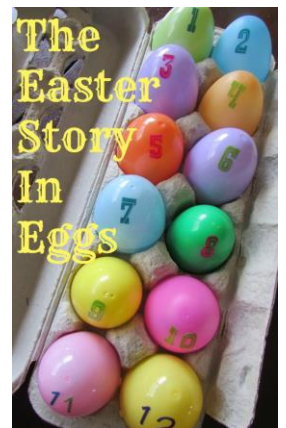

*If you have older and younger kids in your family, consider having the older kids prepare the eggs. What a great way to teach your kids to use the bible! Not only will the lessons be learned, but the kids will be more invested in the activities. ### **Spiritual Conversations about... MOLD?!?!**

Mold is an important part of the natural environment here in the Pacific Northwest. Mold breaks down dead organic matter (such as fallen leaves and dead trees) and reproduces by means of tiny spores. The spores are like seeds that float through the air and deposit on surfaces. What connections can your child see to the themes of death and new life in Easter?

### **Science Experiment: "Christ Himself bore our sins in His body" (1 Peter 2:24)**

Start with white flowers. Add about 20 drops of food coloring to water. And wait. After about a week, the white flower will gradually take on the color of your dye.

# After COVID-19 Vaccination

Thank you for getting vaccinated and helping our communities get one step closer to overcoming this pandemic. **Even after vaccination, it's important to protect others. Most people, including children, are not vaccinated yet. These actions will protect our community.**

1. **Wear a mask.** Wear 2 or more layers. Make sure it's a **snug fit**.
2. **Stay at least 6 feet away from others in public.**
3. **Wash hands often.**
4. **Avoid Crowds.**

6. **If exposed to COVID-19,** check quarantine and testing guidance to know if you should quarantine: [kingcounty.gov/covid/quarantine](https://kingcounty.gov/covid/quarantine)
7. **If you test positive,** follow isolation guidance: [kingcounty.gov/covid/quarantine](https://kingcounty.gov/covid/quarantine)
8. **Follow any relevant workplace or school guidance**

## Reminders about the COVID-19 vaccines:

- **You may have some side effects,** which are normal signs that your body is building protection. Call your healthcare provider if you have any side effects that bother you or do not go away.
- **If you experience a severe allergic reaction to the vaccine, call 9-1-1 or go to the nearest hospital.**
- **Schedule your second dose.** If you are receiving a 2-dose vaccine, make an appointment for the second dose at your vaccination appointment after you receive your first dose. You need both doses to be protected against COVID-19.
- **Protection from vaccine is not immediate.** You are fully vaccinated 2 weeks after a single-dose vaccine or 2 weeks after the second dose in a 2-dose series.

# When you've been fully vaccinated

You are considered fully vaccinated:

- 2 weeks after the second dose in a 2-dose vaccine series (like Moderna or Pfizer)
- 2 weeks after a single-dose vaccine (like Johnson & Johnson)

If it has been less than 2 weeks since your shot, or if you still need to get your second dose, you are **NOT** fully protected. Keep taking all prevention steps until you are fully vaccinated.

## When you're fully vaccinated, you can:

- Gather indoors with other fully vaccinated people without wearing a mask
- Gather indoors without masks with unvaccinated people from no more than one household. Don't gather indoors without masks if any of those people, or anyone they live with, has an increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19
- If you have a known exposure to someone with COVID-19, you probably don't need to quarantine if you are exposed, unless you have symptoms. To be sure, check out the quarantine guidance here:
