A Note about Parish Emails

For years, scammers and bots have been harvesting online information (such as our website) and sending out emails or text messages purporting to be from the leader of the faith community saying he needs you to do something. When you respond back asking what he needs, it asks you to send money in some way, such as gift card codes to help someone in need.

The easiest way to tell this is not Fr. Matthew, Fr. Glen, or Deacon Steve is that they would not ask anyone to send money in this fashion under any circumstances. Additionally, they never come from our email domain - @stjosephparish.org, but are often something like frpyrc.stjosephparish@gmail.com. Sometimes they send out texts stating this is so-and-so's new cell number.

Please never send money to anyone claiming to be from St. Joseph Parish except through our website and online OSV giving platforms that are linked through the website.

Sister Parish Update

We have a major update regarding our Sister Parish in Arcatao, El Salvador. After 16 years as pastor at San Bartolomé, Padre Miguel, who many of us have met and love, is transitioning to a new assignment this summer.

The bishop and provincial are changing his position amid questions Padre Miguel raised about election irregularities in recent local elections. The St. Joseph Sister Parish Committee wrote a letter in support of Padre Miguel, and received a response from the Provincial, which indicates that the decision is final. Padre Miguel is optimistic about his next assignment, time with his home community, and a possible sabbatical to write his memoirs. His successor will be Padre Juan José Colato, SJ who is currently serving in in Managua, Nicaragua. Originally from Honduras, Padre Colato was pastor of San Bartolomé for approximately 4 years in the early 1990's, prior to Padre Miguel's tenure. Padre Miguel has told us that he is very happy that Padre Juan José will be taking over at San Bartolomé Parish.

Padre Miguel will be sorely missed. He has served in the spirit of Archbishop Romero and has been a faithful friend to St. Joseph. There will be a celebration in Arcatao in his honor on May 22nd, organized by the San Bartolomé Parish. More details about how you can participate will be forthcoming!

Pastoral Transition at St. Joseph

Answers to some frequently-asked questions.

What does this mean for St. Joe's?

Deacon Steve will be the Pastoral Coordinator, for up to a year, while Jesuits West, with significant input from our parish, identifies a new Pastor. During this time, we will have the opportunity to collect ideas from you about what the parish needs in a Pastor and communicate that to the Jesuits West province.

What is a Pastoral Coordinator, anyway?

A pastoral coordinator is defined as "a deacon, religious or lay ecclesial minister appointed by the Archbishop under the supervision of a priest moderator and entrusted with the day-to-day leadership of a parish." (The priest moderator will be Fr. Gary Zender, a Seattle priest who supervises the Pastoral Coordinator, but is rarely involved with the day-to-day operations or decisions of a parish.) Deacon Steve will fulfill many of the roles and responsibilities that Glen held, except for certain sacramental duties reserved only for priests.

Who will say Mass? Will we get additional priests?

First of all, Fr. Matthew isn't going anywhere! He will continue to serve as Parochial Vicar at St. Joe's. To help lighten the load, 2 to 4 Jesuit priests from Seattle U and Seattle Prep will rotate sacramental responsibilities.

Where is Glen going? Can I get in contact with him?

As outlined in the letter he sent to parishioners on April 21st, Glen is taking a leave of absence to discern his future. (If you are a registered parishioner and did not receive this letter, please contact Mark – markp@stjosephparish.org) You can drop off any gifts or letters with Renee or Mark at the Parish Center, and we will make sure he receives them.

What's next?

We will miss Glen – he is beloved at the Parish, and not only guided the community through a global pandemic, but also laid the groundwork for a new vision of lay leadership, beginning with a new Pastoral and Mission Council. All of us at the parish – staff, councils, and commissions – are committed to continuing to fulfill this vision of lay leadership, and we have full confidence that Deacon Steve will provide stable, forward-looking leadership in the months to come. 
Ignatian Solidarity Network

The program will be open to students from 7-8th grade and will meet on Sunday afternoons. It will also include a retreat (day) and some service experiences (1/2 day).

When you show up in the life of a young person as a mentor in the faith, they feel valued and welcomed in the parish but also in the Catholic Church as a whole. Middle schoolers are navigating issues of self-esteem, social and emotional upheaval in their friendship groups and activities, physical changes, rising expectations in school, as well as the challenge to begin forming a mature faith. HONORING MARY, THE HOLY SPIRIT, AND PENTECOST MAY 2021



During the month of May we hear a wonderful passage about a living vine. Jesus explains to us that He is the vine and we are the branches. We are connected to Jesus through His teachings and the sacraments. May is also dedicated to Mary. As the first disciple, Mary shows us how to live a life connected to Jesus (the Vine). Sometimes people ask "Do Catholics worship Mary?" St. Louis Marie de Grignion wrote a book to clarify this -- we worship God alone, praise the saints, and honor Mary for her unique role. Coming up on Sunday, May 23 is the Feast of Pentecost. We celebrate the Holy Spirit filling the disciples' hearts and minds to what God was ready to have them do - bring Jesus' message to all.

PRAYER CORNER: NEW PRAYERS TO TRY AS A FAMILY...

An Easter Examen

1. Give Thanks.

I thank God for this day, for my life, for all I am and have, for His Son's sacrifice and Resurrection.

2. Pray for Light.

I ask the Father to let me see my day as the Holy Spirit sees it, and to show me what I need to see to bring light to myself and others.

3. Find God.

I look at my day in the light of the Spirit. I look at what I have done and not done.

Where have I found God? Where have I seen signs of Resurrection?

4. Anything Wrong?

Have I ignored God? Have I neglected God's gifts or forgotten Jesus' suffering? Where have I pleased others instead of pleasing God? I express my sorrow to God and repent of my sins.

5. What Now?

I look forward in hope, that Jesus summons out the best I can be. What am I to do now? How can I let Jesus' love shine out through me? What do I have to avoid?

Ask Jesus' Mother, Mary to pray with you and intercede for you. There are many traditional prayers to ask for Mary's help while you pray.

The Memorare is a prayer that reminds us we have a wonderful advocate and protector in Our Lady.

Wind Fire and Still, Small Voice:

The Holy Spirit is like the wind, a flame and a still small voice.

- Light a candle, how is the flame like the Holy Spirit reflected in your family? Whisper a quiet loving message, how is that like the Holy Spirit?

Use a white piece of construction paper and glue it onto a larger piece of paper (such as wrapping paper of your choice). Make sure there is a border of wrapping paper around the white sheet. Also leave a large border at the bottom so you can scallop or fringe the edge of the border.

Decorate the white sheet with a dove, tongues of fire, and creative wind designs.


