

From your kitchen to neighbors in need: St. Joe's and Facing Homelessness

St. Joe's has been partnering with Facing Homelessness, a direct outreach organization, since 2020. Facing Homelessness provides many services to our houseless neighbors in the U District, including the innovative <u>BLOCK Project</u> tiny house program, but their signature service is the <u>Window of Kindness</u>, an open free lunch + supplies program.

The Window of Kindness serves 30-40 people each day, three times a week. In addition to hygiene kits, clothing, tents, and snacks, each client gets a homemade sandwich for lunch. Almost all of those sandwiches are made with love by St. Joe's parishioners – thank you for the hundreds of sandwiches that you prepare each week!

The Window of Kindness is preparing to open one more day per week, and needs our help. Can you make lunch sandwiches, or donate any prepackaged snacks, hygiene kits, or (new) men's clothing? Let us know. You can drop off donations in the hospitality room any time the church is open (deliveries occur on Tuesdays, so sandwiches should be dropped off on Sunday or Monday).



Jesus went across the Sea of Galilee. A large crowd followed him, because they saw the signs he was performing on the sick. Jesus went up on the mountain, and there he sat down with his disciples. The Jewish feast of Passover was near. When Jesus raised his eyes and saw that a large crowd was coming to him, he said to Philip, "Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?" He said this to test him, because he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Two hundred days' wages worth of food would not be enough for each of them to have a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish; but what good are these for so many?" Jesus said, "Have the people recline." Now there was a great deal of grass in that place. So the men reclined, about five thousand in number. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them to those who were reclining, and also as much of the fish as they wanted. 



Catholic Prison Ministries Coalition (CPMC) is a national network of organizations and individuals serving people affected by incarceration. CPMC's goal is to recruit, train, support, and empower those called to prison ministry. Additionally, CPMC will serve as a central resource for formation and credentialing. We have been approached about two situations where support or housing is needed by immigrant families. If you are able to offer any assistance, please respond directly to those noted.

The Gutiérrez family are Nicaraguan refugees who are currently living (through May 2022) in a Mary's Place-sponsored apartment in the U District. They have three children enrolled at three Seattle Public Schools, are searching to buy a car, and will need assistance finding jobs (work permits to be issued in August). They are career people - a network admin and accountant, but are open to finding any work to support their family. Becoming Antiracist July 2021: Freedom



"To increase your capacity to fight your own complicity in racism, you can start by increasing your awareness of the issues and the people involved. One particular place to start is by reading and learning more about the racial history of the United States. History is about context. So, studying history remains vital. It teaches us how to place people, events and movements within the broader scope of God's work in the world." – from *The Color of Compromise: The Truth about the American Church's Complicity in Racism*, by Jimar Tisby, pg. 194

Scripture: Micah 6:8 "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

History Reference: "When colonists in North America fought and won the war for independence from Britain, they used the rhetoric of liberty and natural rights to argue for the righteousness of their cause. While white soldiers and political leaders were declaring their inalienable rights to independence, they were also enslaving countless women, men, and children of African descent. And the American church participated in and defended the contradiction between freedom and slavery embedded in the constitution of its young nation. Revisiting early American history reveals the shocking forms of hypocrisy that helped shape our society...

The antislavery clause was excised from the final draft of the Declaration of Independence due to the objections of delegates from Georgia and South Carolina as well as some northern states that benefited from slavery...The authors of the Declaration of Independence appealed to the idea of universal human liberty passed down from an all-powerful deity. But the 'universal' rights referenced in the Declaration of Independence were not universally applied." – The Color of Compromise: The Truth about the American Church's Complicity in Racism, by Jimar Tisby, pg.41-43.

Further reading: On July 5, 1852, 3.5 million African Americans were enslaved—roughly 14% of the total population of the United States. Frederick Douglass was asked to deliver a keynote address at the Independence Day celebration. In his now famous speech, "What to the Slave is the Fourth of July," Douglass offered one of the most thought-provoking and powerful testaments to the inhumanity of slavery ever given. Quote: Mary McLeod Bethune (1875-1955) Born to former slaves, Mary devoted her life to ensure the right to education and freedom from discrimination for African Americans. From her speech "What Does American Democracy mean to Me?" "We have always been loyal when the ideals of American democracy have been attacked. We have given our blood in its defense...we have fought for the democratic principles of equality under the law... we have fought to preserve one nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition all men are created equal...we have fought for America with all her imperfections, not so much for what she is, but for what we knew she can be."

Reflection question: What does our faith as Christians tell us about our part to do the work to support freedom for all people in all areas of our earthly life, in economics, education, legal institutions, and in healthcare for all people?

Telling Our Stories



Alan Turing

Did you know the man who broke the Enigma Code, hastening the end of WWII, was gay? Alan Turing was a brilliant mathematician. The work he did as a codebreaker defeated the Nazis and helped bring the war to a close. His work laid the foundation for digital computers and artificial intelligence. He was celebrated as a war hero until 1952 when he was convicted of homosexuality under a Victorian law and forced to undergo chemical castration. By 1954 he was alone and forgotten. That same year he dipped an apple in cyanide and committed suicide. His story breaks my heart. If you want to know more about him, watch the movie "Breaking the Code" with Derek Jacobi. You can find it on YouTube. In 1967 the British government overturned the law used to convict Turing. In 2013 he was posthumously pardoned by the Queen. Now he is on a postage stamp and the 50-pound English note.

Popular Culture

On June 1, LEGO released a new kit "Everyone is Awesome" in honor of Pride month. It was created by Matthew Ashton, a Master LEGO Designer, for his desk at work. When Matthew suggested LEGO make "Everyone is Awesome" an official kit, the company loved the idea. It became one of LEGO's most popular kits of the 2021 Spring/Summer season and sold out in days online. Matthew wanted to use LEGOs to build something that would make the world a more open and welcoming place for gay people because he remembered growing up a gay boy being teased and bullied.
